

TOWN LIBRARY CONSTRUCTION UPDATES

We have great news! The Children's Library construction is now completed, enlarged and brand new. It has moved from the first floor to the second floor of the Town Library and is NOW OPEN! We look forward to having all of our young patrons back for the summer!

Meanwhile, the Main Library construction and renovations are still ongoing, and will continue through most of the rest of 2025. This construction includes new meeting and training facilities, expansion of the Information Technology Department and addition of the Growth Management annex. "This expansion is crucial for meeting the growing needs of our community," said Library Director Aly Herman. "We have quickly outgrown our current youth library, and this project will allow us to significantly enhance the library's collection and programs, benefiting all our patrons."

SIGN UP TO RECEIVE EMERGENCY ALERTS AND SEVERE WEATHER WARNINGS THAT COULD DIRECTLY IMPACT YOU AND YOUR FAMILY

With hurricane season now underway, it is vital that you stay informed. The Town of Lady Lake can send you emergency alerts via text message, email, pager, or voice mail (in extreme cases), based on your preferences. The system is intended to be used for emergency alerts, as well as non-emergency incidents that may have significant impacts to residents. Emergency Alerts could be related to specific hazards that require some kind of action be taken such as evacuation, shelter in place, boil water orders, etc. Non-emergency alerts could include significant transportation problems with prolonged impacts or significant ongoing police or fire activity.

PROTECTING THE FLORIDA AQUIFER

The Florida Aquifer is a vast underground reservoir that supplies fresh drinking water to nearly all of Florida's residents. It feeds springs, rivers, and wells, supporting not only our daily lives but also the state's agriculture and natural ecosystems. Because it's hidden beneath our feet, many people don't realize how fragile it is. Over-pumping can lower water levels, and pollution from chemicals, fertilizers, or septic systems can seep in and contaminate the water. Protecting the aquifer means being careful about what goes on the ground and how much water we use—because once it's damaged, it's hard to fix. Keeping it clean and full ensures safe water for us today and for future generations.
